

### **DIFFERENCE BETWEEN GCSE AND A-LEVEL**

Background research is essential. Candidates are encouraged to keep their knowledge up-to-date, subscribing to "The Geographical Review" etc.

### **ORGANISATION OF WORK**

The syllabus is organised in six modules, examined over the two-year period. A variety of fieldwork will be undertaken to support the syllabus. Students will take part in Fieldwork Visits to prepare them for their individual enquiry.
